OVERVIEW

BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health (JPGSPH), BRAC University was founded in 2004 in Dhaka, Bangladesh to address the unmet public health challenges particular to Asia, Africa and South America. The School's Institutional partners are, BRAC, the world's largest NGO, reaching over 100 million people in Bangladesh and working in 11 countries in Africa and Asia; icddr,b, a leading international health research institute, which fosters innovation in the development and delivery of global life-saving solutions. The School is at BRAC University, a premier higher education and development research institution.

The School draws from Bangladesh's remarkable public health achievements as well as BRAC Health's nationwide services and BRAC International's Health programmes in South Asia and Africa. BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University

therefore offers unparalleled real-life, community-centric teaching, learning and research experiences on critical and emerging national and global public health challenges. The School applies an interdisciplinary integration of Education, Training, Research and Advocacy to diverse health challenges such as, Maternal and Reproductive Health, Nutrition, Gender Equity, Sanitation, Non-communicable Diseases, Urbanisation and Climate Change. Thereby positioning BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University to lead and innovate public health learning, investigation, policy and implementation.

The School builds capacity and contributes to Public Health by preparing individuals to become public health leaders, practitioners, critical thinkers, researchers, advocates, and stewards in order to enable concrete changes to improve the lives of disadvantaged populations locally, regionally and internationally.



BRAC James P Grant School of Public health (BRAC JPGSPH) is located at BRAC University.

BRAC University has 7 Departments, 4 Schools, 3 Institutes and 8 Centres, and offers 16 undergraduate and 16 graduate degrees along with several postgraduate diploma and certificate programmes. The University aims to develop core capacities to accelerate equitable development in Bangladesh. It ensures a high

quality of education and aims to meet the demands of contemporary times.

Its urban and rural research sites and clinical facilities offer important field-based hands-on learning opportunities for students.

COVID-19 has magnified existing structural and social inequalities amongst the most disadvantaged populations, and clearly revealed the fault-lines that exist in public health. This forces us to acknowledge that we cannot simply look at public health from mainly a biomedical lens. We are developing graduates with the practical and critical skills required, so they can contribute in this rapidly changing world, and be competent public health leaders. During the start of COVID-19 last year, the faculty and research team conducted over 45 rapid surveys and longitudinal qualitative and quantitative research, actively engaging with communities, practitioners and other key stakeholders. If there is one lesson that we can take from this unfolding pandemic, is that "experts" do not necessarily have all the answers. A School of Public Health has a critical role in not only providing quality academic education, but also through its research with communities and implementors, to bridge existing gaps in policies and practice. Translating evidence into action is key.

I joined the School in 2004 when we were just 4 colleagues and I took over as Dean in 2013. The School has grown from 66 colleagues in 2012, to presently 296 colleagues, of which 60% are women. The MPH programme has produced 524 public health graduates and leaders from 34 countries. Some

of our graduates have been in the frontline of public health crises such as the Ebola epidemic, headed the Midwifery programme in Afghanistan and joined BRAC, icddr,b and government ministries in Bangladesh and other countries. Many enrolled in PhDs and after their studies, returned to work in their respective countries. Others have joined UN, WHO and other leading organisations around the world. Several of our faculty in the MPH programme are our star graduates from Uganda, Liberia, Australia, and Bangladesh. We were recently cited in a John Hopkins School of Public Health newsletter, as one of the leading Schools in the region, developing world-class expertise in training and capacity development.

We have adjusted and adapted our international MPH academic programme and began online teaching in the third week of March 2020, with a current cohort of 38 students from 14 countries across Europe, Africa, Oceania, South and South-East Asia. We have a pioneering Midwifery diploma programme that was established in 2012, and has 602 graduated midwives as of 2020, with 224 of them presently working in the Rohingya refugee camps.

Our five Centres of Research Excellence: Urban Equity and Health, Gender and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights, Implementation Science & Scale Up, Health Systems and Universal Health Coverage and Non-Communicable Diseases and Nutrition, and our Humanitarian Research Hub are working with research and academic partners across Asia, Africa, Europe, Latin America and North America and in South Asia and South-east Asia. We have generated 137 peer reviewed publications in the last two years and organised 62 policy dialogues, meetings and webinars to inform policies and programmes.

On looking back at the past year and the unprecedented challenges that COVID-19 has thrust upon all of us, I am even more deeply grateful to my Associate Dean, Professor Malabika Sarker, my senior management team, and to all my colleagues for their continued commitment and dedication in striving for a unified vision to become a leading global public health institute for the world's critical health challenges affecting disadvantaged communities.

In conclusion, I would like to take a moment to remember our founder, late Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, whose legacy and dream continues to be profoundly reflected in the vision and mission of the School.


IN MEMORY OF LATE SIR FAZLE HASAN ABED KCMG (1936 - 2019)













Under Sir Abed's leadership, BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health was founded in 2004 in Dhaka, Bangladesh to address the unmet public health challenges particular to Asia, Africa and South America. In realising that a developing country public health needs require immersive, community-based teaching and learning to provide locally innovative research and sustainable health solutions.

Sir Fazle Hasan Abed's vision for BRAC University included the provision of education of the highest quality in the field of public health. Through the combined resources of BRAC and other similar institutions and partners, this vision became a reality through the establishment of the James P Grant School of Public Health.

In 1980, James P Grant, as the newly appointed executive director of UNICEF, started a child survival and development revolution and this revolution was extended to Bangladesh, bringing much higher survival rates for children. Sir Abed met Mr Grant during a conference in 1988, where he congratulated Sir Abed on the work he had been doing in the public health sector in Bangladesh. In 1995, Mr Grant passed away and Sir Abed was invited by the Grant family to speak at the funeral. Here he was pleased and honoured to name the school, BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health after him.

From its onset, the School has been promoting not only the art of public health through education but also the science, with research at the heart of academia.

The access that the School has to BRAC and icddr,b's fieldwork and facilities provide its students with a very unique learning experience. In setting up strong partnerships with leading public health institutions from around the world, the School has established itself as an excellent example in global collaboration for development. BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health is committed to the full realisation of Sir Fazle's dream of ensuring that all developing country health professionals receive a quality degree and contribute to making a difference in their homelands.

Sir Abed was honoured with numerous national and international awards for his achievements in leading BRAC. He has also been recognised by Ashoka as one of the 'global greats'; and is a founding member of its prestigious Global Academy for Social Entrepreneurship. In 2010, he was appointed Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George by the British Crown in recognition of his services to reducing poverty in Bangladesh and internationally. Sir Abed was a member of the Group of Eminent Persons appointed by the UN Secretary-General in 2010 to advise on support for the Least Developed Countries. In 2014 and 2017, he was named in Fortune Magazine's List of the World's 50 Greatest Leaders. Sir Fazle was honoured with a Dutch Knighthood in 2019.



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
MASTER OF PUBLIC HEALTH (MPH)

The Master of Public Health (MPH) Programme at BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health (JPGSPH), BRAC University started its journey in 2005. It is a one-year full time programme that offers transformative public health learning to develop next-generation public health leaders for 21st century public health challenges. The locus of the MPH programme is its experiential community immersive teaching, through rigorous urban and rural fieldwork. Facilitating this real-world contextual learning are the BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University's reputed global and national faculty grounded in critical public health research, practice, programme and practitioners from international institutions including Harvard University, USA; Stanford, USA; McGill University, Canada; Liverpool School of

Tropical Medicine, UK; University of New South Wales (UNSW), Australia; Makerere University, and nationally reputed institutions: BRAC, icddr,b and others.

The School was featured as one of the Top Six Public Health Schools in the region by WHO in 2007, and in 2019 featured in Johns Hopkins University's Global Health Now as a top School in the region .

This Biennial Report covers the journey of the 15th MPH cohort (January 2019 - January 2020) and 16th MPH cohort (January 2020 - January 2021). Since the start of the COVID-19 crisis in Bangladesh, the programme continuous virtually.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING IN THE COMMUNITY

In addition to classroom learning students get the opportunity to practically work in the community, visit service delivery organisations and health facilities to understand different public health problems across diverse areas. This immersion allows practical experience and learning relevant to public health challenges in both rural and urban context. In 2019, students immersed

themselves in urban and rural villages, BRAC Health programme sites and clinics, icddr,b hospital, public and private NGO clinics and observed health activities by informal practitioners, government health services and partner institutions as part of their learning from various modules.

A GLOBAL CLASSROOM OF PUBLIC HEALTH LEARNERS

The School has a global classroom of public health learners with 524 graduates from 34 countries committed to working on priority public health challenges, most of whom live or work in developin

countries. With a 50% female student body, the School nurtures a truly enriching learning atmosphere by combining diverse learners, such as diverse as doctors, nurses, social scientists, development practitioners, and

researchers; with recent graduates in sciences and liberal arts. This allows for the necessary inter-cultural exchange, cross-sectoral experience-sharing and best-practice insights, to collaboratively devise solutions for urgent health problems. The strategic partnerships with BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC and icddr,b, coupled with Bangladesh's remarkable SDG health achievements and innovations, creates the ideal learning laboratory for students.

A highly selective and close-knit group of usually 35 to 40 students yearly, fosters this incomparable global public health classroom of faculty and peer interaction. By learning together and from one another throughout the year, students build meaningful intellectual and personal life-long relationships, which sustain their future public health professional work.





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GLOBAL PUBLIC HEALTH FACULTY AND PRACTITIONERS

Facilitating this real-world contextual learning are the BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University's reputed global and national professors and faculty grounded in critical public health research, practice and programmes. Students gain insightful practical knowledge and know-how from both faculty engaged in applied public health research informing health programmes and policies and leading public health practitioners with extensive experience in strategising, designing and operationalising programmes.

In addition, visiting faculty from diverse discipline and

backgrounds as well as other professions like law, business, media governance, education, etc. provide a comprehensive understanding of the complexities affecting health services.

Alongside the core curriculum, the School draws on diverse faculty specializations and developing world health priorities as global and community health, ethics, applied anthropology, urban poverty, qualitative methods, health programme management, monitoring and evaluation and implementation science.



CAPACITY BUILDING OF STUDENTS IN HIGHER EDUCATION



TDR POSTGRADUATE TRAINING SCHEME ON IMPLEMENTATION RESEARCH

BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University is one of the seven global academic institutions, awarded the World Health Organization's TDR Postgraduate Training Scheme on implementation research for MPH programmes.

Since its inception in 2015, the objective of this five-year grant is to strengthen Low-and Middle-Income Countries (LMICs) and train young public health

professionals on implementation research. The scholarship covers full tuition, accommodation and food, local transport, medical and accidental insurance and implementation research on neglected tropical diseases/infectious diseases of poverty.

In 2020, 13 students from eight different countries were awarded the WHO TDR scholarship from BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University's 16th MPH cohort.



TRANSFORMATIVE COMPETENCY-BASED PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION FOR PROFESSIONAL EMPLOYABILITY IN BANGLADESH'S HEALTH SECTOR (TRANS4M-PH) PROJECT

In collaboration with the International Centre for Climate Change and Development, Independent University of Bangladesh (ICCCAD-IUB), and Asian University for Women (AUW), BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University is working to design and implement the "Transformative Competency-Based Public Health Education for Professional Employability in Bangladesh's Health Sector (TRANS4M-PH)" project. In December 2018, the BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University led tripartite institutional partnership was awarded the prestigious European Union 2018 ERASMUS+ grant: "Capacity Building in Higher Education" with technical partners The University of Maastricht (UM), Netherlands and Institute of Development Studies (IDS), University of Sussex, UK.

The three-year project aims to transform nine courses from BRAC JPGSPH, IUB and AUW into competency-based curricula and 27 faculty members will be trained to facilitate competency-based public health courses that will enhance the professional employability

of public health graduates in the health sector of Bangladesh. Through this project, a core group of indigenous faculty members are being trained in best-practice facilitation, while creatively using appropriate contextualized pedagogy. This, in turn, will substantially improve students' practical public health skill sets towards greater employability.

The first year of the project has been successfully completed in 2019 followed by the review meeting for the first year in January 2020. The project activities included four capacity building workshops for faculty teams from each national partner institution to be trained in competency-based curriculum design and facilitation by the technical partners, UM and IDS. In 2020, due to the pandemic the four capacity building workshops took place remotely. BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University hosted review meetings to discuss and share the implementation challenges and best practices from initial year and the way-forward in starting the second year of the project by all partner institutions.



BRAC JPGSPH AT THE 10TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF CONSORTIUM OF UNIVERSITIES FOR GLOBAL HEALTH (CUGH) IN CHICAGO

At the 10th Annual Conference of Consortium of Universities for Global Health, (CUGH), BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University conducted a concurrent session on "Transformative Competency-based Health Education for the Developing World: The BRAC JPGSPH Experience", from March 7-10, 2019 at the Hilton Hotel in Chicago. The School shared its experience in designing and implementing transformative competency-based public health education that responds to the needs of the developing world in the context of Public Health.

During the session Dr Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University and Mikhail Islam, Strategy and Design Consultant, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University shared how the School's competency-based MPH Curriculum was designed around indigenous developing world health contexts through community-centric, experiential immersive learning; intensive urban and rural fieldwork and pilot solution projects.





Dr Selina Amin, Head, Midwifery Education Programme and Project Director, Developing Midwives Project at BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University shared the competency-based experience on Midwifery Education Programme that is developing a new cadre of midwives in developing countries like Bangladesh.



Professor Malabika Sarker, Associate Dean and Director Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale Up (CoE-SISU) at BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University shared the design and implementation experience from the 'Experiential Implementation Research' module.

SUMMATIVE LEARNING PROJECT (SLP) 2019

The summative learning project (SLP) a nine-week framework for group research is a systematic approach where students and researchers contextualize and analyse the problem from different critical lenses and design research queries under direct supervision from a supervisor and mentor. Students from BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University 15th cohort MPH programme conducted the Summative Learning Project (SLP) in five areas: Model Pharmacy; Urban Health; Heat, Housing and Health; Sexual and Reproductive Health of Young People; and Non-Communicable Disease.

The SLP group on Sexual and Reproductive Health of Young People explored the current situation of integration and implementation of comprehensive sexuality education in secondary schools in Bangladesh.

The Heat, Housing and Health group looked at the perceptions, prevalence, coping mechanisms, and associated housing characteristics regarding heat-related health problems, including heat stress and

sleep disturbance. Interviews were taken from the urban slum residents of Korail, Dhaka.

The Non-Communicable Disease group implemented a quantitative survey with the female breast cancer patients at National Institute of Cancer Research and Hospital (NICRH), Mohakhali, Dhaka.

The Urban Health group explored the influences of lifestyle behaviours and neighbourhood environment on nutritional status of older adolescents in Dhaka metropolitan area.

Finally, the Model Pharmacy group studied the current situation regarding compliance with the Directorate General of Drug Administration (DGDA) guidelines for Model Pharmacy and model medicine shop, challenges and opportunities of implementing the programme and perspectives of the stakeholders (providers, consumers, and authorities) involved.









MPH 2020 (ONLINE LEARNING)

BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University remained committed to continuous learning and has been offering MPH real time online learning from March 22, 2020. 38 students from UK, India, Philippines, Myanmar, Nigeria, Nepal, Fiji, Indonesia, Sierra Leon, Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Maldives and Bangladesh continued the programme online.

Online resource tools such as Zoom, Moodle, Google Classroom and BuX have allowed students and faculty members from around the world to take part in online sessions so that the MPH programme continues and stays on track. Some distinctive features of our online platform included:

- Global faculty and public health practitioners around the world;
- Real-time online interactive lectures followed by Open discussions and Q/A sessions;

- Refresher sessions in specific intervals to review discussions, addressing any queries and allowing this for focused online tutorials;
- Developing qualitative and quantitative research skills during pandemic via online and phone interviews and surveys with community-based respondents (i.e. garment workers, care givers, health providers) from different geographical regions and within Bangladesh;
- Real time structured and need based support/coaching ad supervision by faculty members and Teaching Fellows;
- Breakout sessions for intensive group work and country-based case studies, preparing for debates, online role simulations, etc.;
- Live dialogues with different stakeholders, who attended via panel sessions and webinars;
- Virtual learning management system to allow flexible learning by recording all interactive lectures.



INTERACTIVE ONLINE SESSIONS

In response to the pandemic BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University designed sessions that featured:

- Interactive online group-work to find solutions for practical public health problems in developing world contexts;
- Cutting-edge, real world technical and soft skills learning practices through the Online Platform;
- Participation in online debates, and presenting creative ideas and demonstrating critical thinking skills.

Below are selected outlines of different online courses in 2020:

QUANTITATIVE RESEARCH METHODS (MPH 520): ONLINE QUANTITATIVE RESEARCH METHODS MODULE

During the pandemic unlike other previous online modules, students have done online group work to design a quantitative research query, made data collection plans in a pandemic, collected data online and presented findings in groups under the course Quantitative Research Methods (MPH 520). This course is designed as an intensive, hands-on learning experience that will foster the development of a basic understanding of different research designs and concrete skills in quantitative research methods, with a particular emphasis on survey development.

HEALTH SYSTEM MANAGEMENT (MPH 530): ANALYSE HEALTH SYSTEM AND POLICY OF DIFFERENT COUNTRIES

During the pandemic, MPH students were engaged in active discussions, meaningful exchange of ideas and productive dialogue with health system experts under the Health System Management course (MPH 530). The students also critically reviewed health system contexts and responses to COVID-19 situations in different countries. As per the requirement of the course,

students have also undertaken experiential learning projects on Health System's response to COVID-19 pandemic in different country contexts and applied critical systems thinking approach in order to identify gaps and challenges to find out a possible solution. The course, Health System Management (MPH 530) describes the health system, discusses its different components and explains how these constitute a health system.

EPIDEMIOLOGY OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE (MPH 620): MULTI-COUNTRY VIRTUAL STUDY

This was the first time in the course Epidemiology of Infectious Disease (MPH 620) that the students conducted research in different countries simultaneously, which included the UK, India, Indonesia, Myanmar, Bangladesh, Maldives, Philippines. They collected quantitative and qualitative data through a variety of online data collection platforms including phone interviews, online survey via different online platforms like Google, Facebook. Some of the research included change in healthcare seeking behaviour and

adaptation of behaviour.

Epidemiology of Infectious Diseases (MPH 620), introduces the students to a wide range of infectious diseases through illustrating the principles of infectious diseases around the globe. The course was conducted online and students acquired knowledge on the high burden of disease with data driven presentations from faculty members from all over the world, as well as strategies to reduce infectious disease burden in a low resource contexts.

GENDER, SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS (MPH 660): ONLINE DEBATES

'Online Debates' was an addition and integral part of the course Gender, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (MPH 660). The objective of these debates was for students to understand global policies and local realities, which impacts on rights, and have healthy and logical discussions on the intersections between gender, socio-cultural, political and economic factors as they adversely affect reproductive health experiences and rights.

The Gender, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (MPH 660) module was designed in a way which helped the students acquire broad perspectives on sexual and reproductive health and rights of women and men and other vulnerable groups and gain a layered understanding of the broader factors that shape sexual and reproductive health and rights.

PUBLIC HEALTH NUTRITION (MPH 670): VIRTUAL TOUR OF HOSPITAL SETTINGS IN LMIC: EXPLORING THE NUTRITIONAL STATUS OF CHILDREN

Under the course Public Health Nutrution (MPH 670), the students were able to get a virtual tour of

the icddr,b, Dhaka hospital and see the rehabilitation wards and interview of patients, which helped them understand and conceptualise the causes of malnutrition learning from a hospital setting, gain an idea on assessment of nutritional status of children and women, and the different methods of improving intake of nutrients.

The School prepared practical video shoots on how to assess nutritional status of children and women: anthropometric techniques, Z scores and their

interpretation; assessment of nutritional status:

anthropometric techniques and their use; interviews and interpretation of the findings on management of stunting, underweight, wasting, severe acute malnutrition, and nutritional rehabilitation of severely malnourished children; practical demonstration of the preparation of therapeutic diets: F-75 and khichuri and nutritional rehabilitation.

ENVIRONMENT, HEALTH AND CLIMATE CHANGE (MPH 541): ROLE-PLAY BY THE STUDENTS: EXPLORING DIFFERENT ASPECTS OF ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE CHANGE THROUGH THE LENS OF PUBLIC HEALTH

The course Environment, Health and Climate Change (MPH 541), introduced technology to make the teaching sessions more interactive and interesting such as: video documentaries to explain the relation with health and environment to climate changes; mini workshop and panel sessions with experts from the government and highest international NGOs in the country, futures wheel exercises, simulation sessions, facilitated discussions.

This allowed MPH students the opportunity to be acquainted with environmental determinants and factors broadly affecting health and wellbeing and gained basic understanding and orientation on key concepts, approaches and perspectives of environment, climate change and disaster in the context of public health implication. The course also dealt with the application of selected tools widely used for environmental assessment and further explored how policies and frameworks related to environment and climate change are formulated at national and international level.

SUMMATIVE LEARNING PROJECT 2020 (MPH 700): WORKING WITH DATASET TRANSCRIPTS OF BOTH RURAL AND URBAN

The School provided quantitative and qualitative datasets with transcripts to the MPH students, which were primarily collected by the School for different research projects, along with the data collection tools, project details, background information, etc. to make them familiar with the studies. Some students scoped reviews; this was introduced to them as an essential alternative to primary research. This was the first online based research of their career. Supervisors from each SLP

DEVELOPING MIDWIVES PROJECT



MIDWIFERY EDUCATION PROGRAMME: DIPLOMA IN MIDWIFERY (DMP)

Bangladesh has made a commitment to end preventable child and maternal deaths by 2030. For reaching the goal the healthcare planners have prioritized antenatal care (ANC), postnatal care (PNC), normal vaginal delivery (NVD), emergency obstetric care (EmOC), newborn care and family planning (FP) which links to quality maternal health services. Given the plan and large number of maternity cases in Bangladesh, the country demands a huge supply of midwives to ensure healthy motherhood. An estimated 22,000 midwives will be required to meet the national need. To address this

need the government introduced midwifery into the health system. Moreover, United Nations; 'Every Woman Every Child' plan, gives the midwifery programme a momentum. To help attain the country target, BRAC University launched the 'Developing Midwives Project' (DMP) and introduced the course in 2012 as the first ever midwifery education initiative in Bangladesh's private sector. Funded by the UK Government, this innovative education initiative develops around 230 midwives every year in partnership with six renowned NGOs of Bangladesh.

ACTIVITIES IN 2019



- Department for International Development (DFID) initiated the Mid-term Review (MTR) of the DMP in May 2019. As a part of MTR, a team from DFID visited DMP, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University. The MTR covered the progress from the second phase beginning in October 2016 until the end of March 2019. The Mid-term Review Team scored 'A' to DMP together with UNFPA Bangladesh.
- All 179 students of the 3rd batch of midwifery completed their diploma course during this year. To celebrate the day, the graduation ceremony was arranged by all six Academic Sites (AS). All graduates were given a midwifery kit as a token of appreciation. Midwife Parboti Sutrodhar, Shimantik AS, who stood first in registration (licensing) exam in 2018, was given an award by the project.
- DMP had inaugurated two separate Midwife-Led Care Centre (MLC) successfully in Dhaka and Sylhet. In Dhaka Mirpur, Harirampur MLC 461 Normal Vaginal Deliveries (NVD)s were conducted. Among them 331 were delivered in birthing chairs. Also, 651 women performed exercises. In Charikata Union, Jaintyapur, Sylhet Health and Family Welfare Centre MLC, 709 NVDs were conducted, among them, 332 were delivered in birthing chairs and 2260 women performed exercises. The inauguration ceremony was organised on 17 January, 2019. Dr Kazi Mustafa Sarwar, Director General, Directorate General of Family Planning was the Chief Guest of the inauguration ceremony. The MLC was established so that midwifery students can

- practice and learn midwifery skills as well as mothers from the community receive 24/7 maternal services from competent and professional midwives who have graduated from BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University.
- 461 students were in a clinical placement to practice safe deliveries and to practice antenatal, postnatal care and family planning services. A total of 2577 normal vaginal deliveries were performed by them.
- On 24 June, DMP organised a meeting with Private Midwifery Institutes (PMI) where representatives from national and international organisations e.g., Royal College of Midwifery (RCM), United Nation Population Fund (UNFPA), Department of International Development (DFID) and 10 other private institutions participated and discussed about the different hurdles they faced.
- Technical Advisory Group (TAG) meeting was held on February 26, where 29 representatives of member organisations like Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB), Johns Hopkins Program for International Education in Gynecology and Obstetrics, World Health Organization (WHO), United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (icddr,b), Directorate General of Nursing and Midwifery (DGHS), BRAC, Bangladesh Midwifery Society (BMS) etc. participated and discussed on importance of establishing more Midwife-Led Care Centres (MLCs).

TRAINING

Two faculty development trainings were conducted with the participation of 66 faculty members in both the trainings. Andrea Gilkison and Claire Hotchin from Auckland University of Technology (AUT), New Zealand, took several sessions on different modules both in January and July, 2019 training while, Dr Sabiha Haque Lobbes, a renowned pediatrician from Germany, also conducted a daylong session on 'Helping Baby's Breath' in January. In addition, session on cervical cancer screening conducted by Prof Jannat Ferdous from Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) and Postpartum Family Planning by International Federation of Gynecology of Obstetrics (FIGO) experts. Renowned Mother Teressa award and 'Ekushe Padak' winner Prof Dr Sayeba Akhter, and Jennifer Stevens from United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) also facilitated interactive and practical sessions.

They also attended a day-long refresher training on same topic held on 5 November, at LAMB academic site, facilitated by the Counsellor. ADVOCACY -

As registration exam of midwives and nurses was on hold for about a year, BRACU advocated for holding registration (license) exam at the earliest possible time and met the Attorney General at the Supreme Court with Prof. Rowshan Ara Begum, Ex-president Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) and renowned gynaecologist, The United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) and Bangladesh Nursing and Midwifery Council (BNMC) on 22 October, 2019. There was a thorough discussion with the Attorney General and papers related to the issue were submitted to him. BRACU also visited Md. Ashadul Islam, Secretary Health Services Division, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) and requested for his support on the problem, On February 11, court case was granted for the BNMC and licensing/ registration exam was held on 28 February.

- 8 abstracts were accepted for 32nd International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) Triennial Congress, Bali 2020. Accepted abstracts mostly highlighted DMP's different achievements, learnings and challenges.
- 2 presentations titled "Respectful Maternity Care as an Integral Part of Midwifery Impact in Increasing Normal Vaginal Delivery" and "Community Engagement in Midwifery Education Enhanced the Competence and Confidence of Midwives" respectively were presented in the 28th International Scientific Conference organised by Obstetrical and Gynaecology Society of Bangladesh (OGSB).
- DMP participated the 12th South Asia Federation of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (SAFOG) conference where four BRACU midwives (working in midwifery led centers of Dhaka and Sylhet) shared their experience in a session titled "Comprehensive Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights by Midwives".

DMP observed "16 days of activism", an international campaign to challenge violence against women and girls. The theme of the year was "Orange the World: Generation Equality Stands against Rape." On this occasion, BRACU Hub shared a book with all academic sites about sexual violence on children. The students went through the book titled, "If Only Someone Had Broken the Silence" written by Kamla Bhasin. The students also staged a drama and gave a presentation on their understanding of the book which was viewed and evaluated by locally inspiring women for the award-giving ceremony.



- All 7 academic sites celebrated "Open school day" to increase public awareness on midwifery. Stalls were set up on different themes e.g., general health checkup, normal vaginal delivery (NVD), counseling on antenatal care (ANC), postnatal care (PNC), family planning, nutrition etc. Besides another stall named "Admission Booth" was available for free registration of interested midwifery candidates.
- On 12 May, 2019, Advisor of DMP, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury, Selina Amin Head of Midwifery Education Programme and Sharmina Rahman, Strategy Advisor met Dr Asa Torkelsson, Representative of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) in Bangladesh. The meeting highlighted BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University's contribution in midwifery programme along with the government, launching an international midwifery conference with UNFPA and scope of future collaboration and coordination. Dr Asa Torkelsson expressed her desire to visit BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University midwifery programme and was happy to hold a conference together.
- Advisor of DMP, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University, Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury, Dr Selina Amin Head of Midwifery Education Programme and Sharmina Rahman, also met Dr Bardan Jung Rana, World Health Organization (WHO) Representative to Bangladesh on August 19. The WHO representative showed keen interest in the midwifery programme in Bangladesh and BRAC's health programme as a whole. Dr Bardan Jung Rana showed his interest for future collaboration and coordination with BRAC JPGSPH, BRACU.

- DMP presented its achievements in the "10th Annual Consortium of Universities for Global Health" conference held at Chicago, USA along with the Dean, Associate Dean, Advisor and Learning Design Consultant of BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University. The presentation about midwifery also generated great interest amongst the participants with other BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University presentations.
- As a part of the exposure visit, the DMP team visited Cambodia where they met officials from the Cambodian Midwifery Council, Midwifery Association, Government and Private Midwifery Institutes. They also visited rural health care centres providing maternity care during their visit.
- DMP celebrated "International Day of the Midwife" on 5 May along with the seven Academic Sites (ASs). The celebration had two-fold activities. As part of community engagement, all the ASs arranged community visit, discussion session and parliamentary debate on issues related to midwifery education and profession. As part of mass reach out, DMP participated in 3 TV talk shows in 3 different TV channels. Representatives from Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), Bangladesh Nursing and Midwifery Council (BNMC), Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) and Bangladesh Midwifery Society (BMS) were present in these talk shows.

Head of DMP, Counsellor and one Senior Instructor visited Fernandez Hospital (FH), Hyderabad. In the visit, the team presented DMP achievements and learning to FH. Their Chairperson Dr Evita Fernandez made a presentation as well. There was an excellent exchange of learning between the two organisations. From the visit, the team gained information about their midwifery education



system, detailed plan of their Midwife-Led Care Centre (MLC) model, services such as aromatherapy, water birth, music therapy etc.

- Project Manager of the Dhaka Academic Site (AS) attended Women Deliver Conference at Vancouver, Canada and learnt how empowering midwives can transform communities to promote gender equality. Exposure visits are expected to help introduce innovation in future programming.
- An opinion editorial from DMP's Advisor Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury and Project Director Dr Selina Amin was published in the Daily Star titled "Midwifery Education in the private sector: The hurdles along the way".



ACTIVITIES IN 2020

DMP adopted the online based platforms i.e.,
 Facebook live, zoom platform etc. in early May to continue the midwifery education classes. 80% of the students took the live class and almost all

took the courses after downloading. Students were grouped in 10-15 under one faculty to take tutorial classes and to have intensive follow up. Regular online model tests were also held.





- 1162 normal vaginal deliveries (NVD) took place in Midwifery led Care Centres (MLCs) at Mirpur BRAC Health, Nutrition and Population Programme Centre and Charikata Union Health and Family Welfare Centre (UH&FWC) where 736 NVDs were performed using birthing chair, an alternative birth position promoted while the UH&FWC in general struggle to attract maternity cases, the MLC UH&FWC at Charikata, Sylhet is working very well.
- Department for International Development (current Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office) had commissioned the Annual Review of DMP in June, 2020. DMP scored grade 'A' once more in the Strengthening Midwifery in Bangladesh Programme together with The United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Bangladesh through this review.
- The Project working with International Confederation of Midwifery (ICM) for reviewing ICM global standard for midwifery education and for developing accreditation tools.

- Around 53 participants of DMP participated in two virtual Project Coordination Committee (PCC) meetings in June and December. Advisor Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury and Dr Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean and Professor, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University and Dr Shehlina Ahmed Health Advisor, Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office also participated in this meeting. The meeting highlighted the effect of COVID 19 pandemic in midwifery education in terms of practical skills, quality and inability to pay the tuitions by several students and discussed mitigation strategies, especially continuation of online education.
- The Virtual Technical Advisory Group (TAG) meeting was held on December 22, 2020 where importance of continuation of online course was discussed. However, TAG members expressed their concerns regarding lack of skill practices. Successful activities in the Midwifery-Led Care (MLC) Centres during COVID-19 was highly appreciated.

TRAINING


 On 16 March 628 students in 7 academic sites of DMP received training on COVID-19 before leaving for home. They in turn provided training at home with the posters and leaflets provided by BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University to distribute in their communities.



• Two faculty development trainings were organised in the month of January and July, 2020. First one was organised by "Friends in Village Development Bangladesh (FIVDB)" academic site, Sylhet and the second one was arranged virtually due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Around 60 faculty members were present in both the trainings. Divisional Director, Family Planning, Sylhet Mohammad Kutubuddin was the chief guest of the inaugural session of the faculty development training in Sylhet. Mother Teresa Award and Ekushey padak winner gynaecologist Professor

Sayeba Akhter conducted a session on 'Sayeba's method'. Dr Ahmed Al-Sabir former Director NIPORT and Professor Parvin Fatema, Gynaecologist and National Coordinator of International Federation of Gynaecology of Obstetrics (FIGO) conducted participatory sessions as well. - DMP organised 3 (one national and two international) webinars focusing on midwifery education and services during COVID-19 pandemic. Speakers from Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Afghanistan and New Zealand spoke in these sessions and generated in depth discussion on midwifery services in resource limited setting during COVID-19 pandemic. The webinars also drew the attention of stakeholders to adapt innovation from other countries experiences with more than 100 participants in each webinar. Representatives from Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO), Canada's Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD), The Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit GmbH (GIZ) were present in the session. The President of Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) and Bangladesh Midwifery Society (BMS) provided their inputs as well.
- DMP also organised two programmes as a part of observing "16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence: Orange the World: Fund, Respond, Prevent, Collect"

- a) A webinar was arranged on 9 December where the students themselves were the participants. Seven students from 7 academic sites presented and shared their views based on their own experiences on gender-based violence, its impacts, and ways of preventing GBV. Their participation was lively and informative. One of the participants stated that: "In my observation protesting with politeness is not working in society anymore. We have to raise a strong voice."
- b) A workshop for the DMP hub staff entitled "Psychosocial support for the survivors of GBV" held on 7 December facilitated by the Counsellor and Deputy Manager, Finance & Accounts of DMP. The purpose of this workshop was to help the team understand the psychological process, impacts on the victims of gender-based violence and how we can provide them psychosocial support. The workshop also focused on the role of the male members of the society in eliminating gender-based violence.



- DMP arranged two virtual meetings with Private Midwifery Institutions (PMI)s held in September and October. The meetings highlighted the importance of developing a platform to raise the issues of private institutes, maintain quality of education and update their knowledge. A Convening Committee was formed where Professor Rowshan Ara, Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) is the Chair, Zahiduzzaman of Hope Foundation is the Co-chair and Dr Selina Amin, Project Director, DMP is the Member Secretary.
- On May 5, 2020 DMP observed "International Day of the Midwives (IDM 2020)" where students from all academic sites took part in an essay writing



competition on the "Role of midwives in COVID-19 situation in Bangladesh".

• DMP also observed virtual "Safe Motherhood" day with Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) on May 28 and contributed in publishing a poster both virtually and on Dainik Samakal newspaper, in collaboration with Save the Children. In addition, an event on poster drawing on the theme "করোনাকালে ঘরে থাকি, মা, শিশুকে নিরাপদ রাখি" was organised where students from all academic sites participated.

The School's international training hub established in 2007, Centre for Professional Skills Development in Public Health (CPSD) strengthens and upgrades the requisite professional skills utilised by practitioners, policymakers, development partners, government officials, public advocates, faculty, researchers and frontline health workers.

CPSD provides practical skill-based training for relevant public health priorities and needs and encourages solution-oriented thinking to address practical 'real world' challenges. The centre's workshops are codesigned critical competencies for professional training to ensure relevant capabilities are developed, in addition to ensuring, interactive teaching and learning this includes, innovative tools for in-person, field-based and online learning and participant centred learning to promote critical thinking. Immersive learning by visits to field sites, such as rural urban communities, health facilities (public, NGOs, private) and organisations (public, NGOs, private) are also a part of these workshops.

CPSD's diverse expert facilitators include, practitioners, policy makers and multi sectoral actors (i.e., government, NGOs, INGOs, civil society, private sector). The training programmes have a diverse range of expert facilitators which include public health practitioners, medical professionals, anthropologists, health economists, statisticians, development practitioners, policy makers, programme managers, and academics from well-established international and national institutions.

The trainings include a wide range of participants including government officials, medical doctors, senior health education officers, senior staff nurses, researchers, statisticians, NGO sector specialists, development practitioners, programme officers and managers, academics, activists, mainstream media, student youth groups and individuals from marginalised communities.

Brief: Under the Agreement for Performance of Work with the World Health Organization (WHO), Bangladesh and BRAC JPGSPH were contracted to coordinate and facilitate, in close collaboration with WHO Bangladesh and Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), for training on the package of essential non-communicable diseases (PEN) interventions to 100 doctors, nurses, and medical

assistants/SACMO/paramedics; and 300 Supervisors of Community Health Workers and Community Health Workers working in the Rohingya camps and also in the eight Upazila health complexes (UHC) of Cox's Bazar District. A total of 409 health care providers were trained.

The objectives of the training were to enhance knowledge, skills and practices of primary health care workers in the early detection and appropriate management of cardiovascular diseases (CVD) and Type 2 Diabetes using a total CVD risk-based approach. For the training of the Supervisors of Community Health Workers and Community Health Workers, WHO and BRAC JPGSPH worked together to develop a flipchart on Non-communicable Diseases. The flipchart was also used during the training.

Brief: Shahana Siddiqui spoke about the intricacies and complexities of consent and the social and cultural norms that dictate it.

Brief: Dr Hamid showed how Health Microinsurance (HMI), which has been used around the globe since the

early 1990s for financial risk protection against health shocks in poverty-stricken rural populations in low-income countries to increase access to healthcare or utilisation of healthcare, fails to provide financial risk protection against health shocks under its current practices in South Asia.





SEMINAR ON "HAITI HEALTH SYSTEM: STANDARDS AND PRACTICE"

Date: 25 November, 2019

Presenter: Dr Alain Casseus, a Project Manager who is overseeing a United States Agency for International Development (USAID) related project, a Partners in Health (PIH) Canada funded project on malnutrition, and two Mass General Hospital research projects funded by National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Gates.

Brief: Dr Casseus explained the healthcare system in Haiti and spoke about issues such as the challenges faced by Community Health Workers (CHW), the shortage of funds and human resources. He also spoke about how the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Haiti collaborates with NGOs and INGOs working in Haiti to tackle the challenges in health care and sustain their current health care regime.

Department of Health Services Policy and Management at the University of South Carolina, Columbia, SC, USA, presented at the seminar held at BRAC JPGSPH.

Brief: Dr Mahmud Khan shared the findings from the study on the rate of C-section; the Maternal Health Voucher Scheme (MHVS), a demand-side financing strategy; and how the incentives affected consumer behaviour.











ONLINE SKILLS DEVELOPMENT IN 2020

As COVID-19 slowly made its way to Bangladesh, BRAC JPGSPH geared to deal with the crises by spreading awareness and taking necessary measures (i.e., maintaining social distancing, mandating wearing facial mask and hand washing etc.) while arranging physical workshops, seminars and/or short courses during the pandemic. From March 2020 onwards, the School has been circulating weekly situation reports on COVID-19 throughout BRAC University.

Between 1 to 18 March 2020, the School conducted three internal training sessions to acknowledge the public health emergency and to spread awareness among faculty, students and staff on standard practices during COVID-19 pandemic. The School conducted three internal training sessions, overseen by Professor Kaosar Afsana. Materials for the training were aggregated from World Health Organization (WHO), Bangladesh Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) and BRAC.

Since April 2020, BRAC JPGSPH has been hosting a series of webinars every week to address the public health emergency related to the virus, through sharing of useful resource material, dialogues and in-person meetings, locally and globally to a wider audience, including BRAC University, health organisations, key stakeholders, partners, and networks. Faculty and staff from the School are also being invited to webinars hosted by national and international organisations.

Also, an orientation and awareness programme on COVID-19 was organised for the staff of the BRAC Learning Centre (BLC), at Niketon, Dhaka, where the School's MPH international students reside.

On November 1, 2020, an agreement was signed between Centre for Professional Skills Development in Public Health (CPSD) and Bangladesh Health Watch (BHW), with a grant of BDT 14,514,000 (US\$174,867) from Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA). Under this agreement, CPSD will be undertaking 12 short courses and one pilot course between 2021 and 2022 under the following four themes:

- COVID-19 and its containment in Bangladesh: equity, voice and governance
- Transparency for Good Governance
- Voice and Participation
- Equity for Accessing Health Services.

Approximately 300 participants will be trained between 2021 and 2022. The potential participants will be programme planners and managers of the government, NGO and private sector, university faculty (particularly public health), and other professionals in the health sector, and journalists. Experiential learning methodology will be followed to conduct these short courses. A feedback session will also be organised after completion of each course, which will be useful for refining course content in the future. Additionally, each participant after the training would develop an action plan on how they would implement the newly acquired knowledge and skills in the field.




WEEK LONG TRAINING ON AWARENESS



CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE FOR GENDER, SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS (CGSRHR)

Established in 2008, The Centre aims to promote a broader understanding of gender, sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) in Bangladesh and in the region through research, policy, advocacy and training activities. Using both academic and action-based research, the Centre generates knowledge and translates it into advocacy-based action for social change. Research topics under the Centre include HIV/AIDS, reproductive health service, gender-based violence, child marriage, digital tools for SRHR, bodily rights and behaviour change communication.

To promote SRHR, the Centre organises and conducts short trainings and courses that aim to stimulate critical thinking and reflections among practitioners. The Centre also facilitates advocacy efforts with various partners and networks to bring about greater awareness on relevant areas of SRHR work. Recent advocacy efforts have addressed SRHR and law, masculinity and men's sexual health, and rights-based issues of minorities and disadvantaged communities.

NATIONWIDE STUDY OF SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS (SRHR) OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (PWDS) IN BANGLADESH

CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE FOR HEALTH SYSTEMS AND UNIVERSAL HEALTH COVERAGE (COE-HS&UHC)





Established in 2012, the Centre works with key partners and stakeholders in the government, private and NGO sectors to facilitate the efforts to accelerate evidence-informed, equitable and sustainable action towards Urban Health Coverage (UHC). As part of its core activities, the Centre works to generate essential evidence to further the establishment of UHC in Bangladesh; these include policy briefs and systematic reviews of key determinants of UHC including workforce, management, and information systems. Frameworks are produced on key functions of insurance systems related to provider networks, service packages, premiums, benefits and claims. Implementing research

on UHC initiatives is also conducted with real-time monitoring and evaluation systems.

The Centre also develops core competencies around UHC through various accredited training programmes and short courses. These programmes are held with key implementing institutions of UHC in Bangladesh. Advocacy is another major core activity of the Centre, and is facilitated through forums, learning and research dissemination with local and global partners. National and international workshops, seminars and dialogues are also held focusing on key UHC issues.

Established in 2013, with the focus on health equity challenges of the urban poor, particularly on urban health governance; the Centre works in inter-sectoral research, training, policy and results-based action. The Centre motivates evidence-based dialogue and decision-making, and supports partnerships and networking among government policymakers, private and public service providers, researchers and development partners.

The key areas of the Centre's work include training and capacity development to enhance skills and

competencies for better urban health governance, inter-sectoral action, needs and impact assessments as well as programme design, implementation and evaluation. Research at the Centre focuses on urban health governance, community engagement and accountability, and facility mapping and innovations in service delivery models for the urban poor. Established in 2016, the main objective of the CoE-SISU is to timely generate and embed knowledge related to healthcare practice. The Centre aims to bridge gaps to allow successful scaling up and implementation of interventions by focusing on testing different methodologies, generating evidence-based interventions and innovations, and translating them into standard protocols for policy-makers in Bangladesh.

Research conducted at the Centre reviews potential evidence of successful interventions that can showcase

the application of science of implementation for scaling-up. Guidelines and policy briefs are produced for policymakers on implementation of various health programmes and scale-up in Bangladesh. Advocacy efforts include the development of communication materials to showcase successfully implemented or scaled up programmes. Training and short courses are offered under the Centre on implementation research and, monitoring and evaluation to build capacity of development professionals, implementers, researchers and government officials.

Objective: An implementation study to explore pressing implementation drivers and barriers of the birth and death registration system in Bangladesh and identify potential solutions to overcome the barriers, especially focusing on the Kaliganj model, to ensure universal birth and death registration within 45 days of the event.

CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE FOR NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES AND NUTRITION (CNCDN)





Established in 2017, the Centre aims to reduce mortality and complications related to Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) and malnutrition in Bangladesh through prevention, treatment and control. The Centre conducts research and works with the government of Bangladesh to develop guidelines for prevention, treatment and control, and perform evidence-based advocacy around NCDs and malnutrition.

Research at the Centre includes identifying evidence-based practices in clinical and population settings, implementing health system research to optimise delivery of interventions, and conducting economic evaluation of novel and evidence-based interventions. Health care providers are trained on risk stratification for NCDs through prevention and management. The Centre also strengthens capacity of programme managers and policy makers on evidence-based policy and interventions for prevention and control.

To further promote and advocate for the prevention, treatment and control of NCDs and malnutrition, and encourage people to adopt healthier lifestyles, the Centre also develops communication materials based on their research.

HUMANITARIAN RESEARCH HUB



The rise of armed conflict, forced displacement, environmental disasters and other humanitarian crises is a direct result of natural hazards and major disease outbreaks. This has not only led to the increase of sufferings of hundreds of millions of lives but now more so than ever in history, more people are facing public health issues.

As of August 2017, more than 1.1 million Rohingya refugees in need of humanitarian assistance have migrated to Bangladesh. In order to improve their access

to public health aid, multiple national and international organisations are tirelessly working across all camps in Cox's Bazar.

Sharing the same vision since 2018, BRAC JPGSPH continues to conduct research studies on Rohingya refugees across three of its Centres of Excellence in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh; in efforts to comprehend the gaps in public health service delivery and to identify challenges to improve well-being of the Rohingya community.

AN ETHNOGRAPHIC STUDY: HEALTH SEEKING BEHAVIOUR FOR SRH SERVICES OF ROHINGYA WOMEN IN ROHINGYA CAMPS OF COX'S BAZAR

Objective: The aim of this assessment was to investigate the women's and community's perceptions and behaviours influencing healthcare-seeking practices related to pregnancy, childbirth, newborn care and family planning. It also aims to understand the decision-making process of family dynamics, the socio-cultural and religious beliefs and practices and to identify the challenges in health-seeking for pregnancy, childbirth, newborn care and family planning services from providers as well as women's perspectives.

Timeline: March 2019 - July 2019

Donor and Partner: World Health Organization (WHO), Bangladesh.



LEARNING THROUGH PLAY: LOOKING INTO PLAY LAB IN GOVERNMENT PRIMARY SCHOOL OF BANGLADESH

Objective: A qualitative study to illustrate the lessons learnt in mainstreaming play based learning model among four to five year old children in government primary school. The project aimed to understand the perspectives of community and key stakeholders about play based learning model, to describe the changes in the development of children exposed to the activities of the Play Lab and to document the driving force for and the challenges to initiate and implement the Play Labs in the government primary spaces.

BRIDGING COMMUNITIES IN COX'S BAZAR: MITIGATING RISKS AND PROMOTING GENDER, GOVERNANCE AND LOCALISATION OF HUMANITARIAN RESPONSES IN COVID-19 ERA

Objective: A qualitative and quantitative study with an overall objective of the Rohingya camp and host communities in relation to the project is to provide pressing evidence to influence policies and interventions that will promote tolerance and peace building, encourage civic engagement and facilitate psycho-social wellbeing. The study will widen dissemination of research findings through meetings and dialogues with government representatives, volunteers, CBOs, local NGOs and UN agencies to share emerging findings and recommendations using online offline platforms.





COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESEARCH

COVID-19 is disproportionately affecting Bangladesh's poor and most vulnerable, including informal slum settlement residents, the rural poor and extreme poor, sexual minorities, ethnic minorities, refugees, persons with disabilities, sex workers, domestic workers, factory workers, daily-wage earners, and front-line workers and so forth. Since the outbreak of COVID-19 the School has been conducting both qualitative and quantitative research assessments.

Until December 2020 the School has undertaken 45 rapid quantitative and qualitative research assessments, including 19 research briefs and 4 peer-reviewed publications on COVID-19.

Objective: The issues raised in the study were quantity and appropriate quality of PPEs supplied, trainings on COVID-19 and use of PPE, measures to ease mental health of the FLWs etc.

"One major challenge we faced, during the COVID-19 Rapid Researches, was reaching the respondents as there were many times when they were unreachable and unavailable. In order to mitigate this issue interviews were rescheduled multiple times according to the respondent's convenience.

Another issue we faced in conducting phone interviews for the rapid research was difficulty in communicating and building rapport with respondents through the phone as one person alone was conducting the interview and taking notes at the same time. In order to sort this issue, we reassured them through referring to the person who gave their name and contact number. Also during the silences and pauses for taking notes, we informed respondents and requested a few minutes for note taking.

One other major challenge we faced during the remote interviews for rapid research was interrupted interviews in which cases we had to reschedule each interview multiple times."

Objective: In response to the COVID-19 crisis, the Government of Bangladesh (GoB) has initiated many interventions and programmes (e.g. Mass aid services), however, whether persons with disabilities are benefiting from these services still remains to be explored. To better understand the life conditions of persons with disabilities during COVID-19, this rapid qualitative research assessment focused on the dimensions of livelihood, wellbeing and food security of persons with disabilities across six sites of Bangladesh.

"We performed telephone interviews from Dhaka to Cox's Bazar. The telephone network of Cox's Bazar was not good. It took a whole day or more to complete one interview. In addition, there was a language barrier. The respondents did not speak but understood Bengali. Thus, they responded in their own dialect when we asked them a question. Moreover, we did not have any interpreters. We had to ask a question several times to understand their response and listen to the recordings repeatedly while transcribing."

As a result, the citizens of the country are likely to feel extra mental health duress and face loss of psychological well-being. In this brief BRAC JPGSPH has carried out this rapid survey.

Objective: From World Health Organization's (WHO) declaration of a Global Public Health Emergency in January 2020 to identification of the first case in the country in early March 2020, neither the ministry nor the political establishment was found to rise to the occasion and provide the necessary stewardship for coordinated response to contain the outbreak. Uncertainty about the roles and responsibilities of the different agencies of the health ministry and the government at large and there was lack of coordination among them which baffle any description. It then entered the community transmission phase when experts were expecting a surge in the number of the patients and a catastrophic scenario for the poorly prepared health systems. In this scenario, it was important to look at the conditions of the health workers who are at the frontline of the fight against COVID-19. This quick assessment is being done to elicit the knowledge, perceptions, barriers and enablers, and lived social experiences by the FLWs vis-à-vis management of COVID-19 epidemic currently sweeping the country.

Methodology: This time-bond study of cross-sectional design by mixed method approach is currently being conducted.

Objectives: BRAC's COVID-19 response has a three-pronged approach which will be followed by long term livelihood support work for the economically affected families: Protection of Staff and Community; Communication and mass awareness; New Partnerships for Prevention, Detection, and Response. BRAC's overarching focus for the COVID-19 response in Bangladesh is to prevent community-level outbreak as much as possible in the coming days by mobilising over 90,000 field staff and community health volunteers to reach millions of households. In public health emergencies, we often do not prioritise documentation of the rapid response processes undertaken by large organisations like BRAC that have played a critical role in the history of the country.

Methodology: Key Informant Interviews (KIIs) and In-depth Interviews (IDIs) were used with chosen participants. Themes included BRAC's overall response to the crisis as well as the particular functional area's responses.

BRAC JPGSPH believes in advocating to impact programme design and policies, closely engaging with government, key stakeholders (i.e., non-government organisations, international agencies), civil society and donors to push agendas of national and global importance. All research evidence undertaken by the School have policy and advocacy as part of their key mandate. The aim of the five Centres of Excellence and the Humanitarian Research Hub is to continually engage in translating research evidence to inform programme and policy interventions.

During this public health emergency of COVID-19, the School is actively engaged in sharing evidence with

mainstream media, government advisors, citizens' platform-Bangladesh Health Watch (BHW) and many other civil society bodies, on current needs of disadvantaged populations.

In 2020, the School has organised more than 37 Webinars related to COVID-19 and published above 95 News Articles and 21 Blogs. The School also actively aggregates and shares useful resource materials, locally and globally to a wider audience, including BRAC university, health organisations, key stakeholders, partners, and networks which include seminars, online dissemination events, policy dialogues, internal blogs, articles published in newspapers, social media campaigns, sharing daily COVID-19 updates, etc.

ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS



THE GLOBAL CONFERENCE ON IMPLEMENTATION SCIENCE AND SCALE-UP (GCIS), 2019

From 29 June till 1 July, 2019, the first ever Global Conference on Implementation Science and Scale-Up (GCIS) was held in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The conference was co-hosted by the Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH, UNICEF Bangladesh, and co-sponsored by TDR, Geneva.

GCIS aimed to create a global platform with specialists and implementers from leading organisations to understand and share their experiences on implementation science and research in scaling-up and sustaining social programmes in a national context. With 250 participants from 30 countries, including researchers, implementers, government officials and international donor and partner organisations, the conference held multiple plenary sessions on research capacity on implementation science for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Universal Health Coverage (UHC) targets; 15 parallel sessions were held, over the course of the conference on topics ranging from strengthening institutional research (IR) capacity in the TDR supported postgraduate schemes, IR in response to the malnutrition challenge in Bangladesh and involving multi-sectoral collaboration.







ACTIVE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT ON COVID-19 AT BRAC UNIVERSITY

On February, 2020, BRAC JPGSPH organised 'Outbreak of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)', an attempt to share the overall COVID-19 situation globally and nationally to discuss how we can prevent an outbreak in Bangladesh, in presence of representatives from Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR), Government of Peoples' Republic of Bangladesh.

ENGAGING COMMUNITIES IN THE TIMES OF COVID-19: SONAR-GLOBAL WEBINAR

On February, 2020 BRAC JPGSPH engaged with regional partners of Sonar-Global; a global platform funded by the European Union's Horizon 2020 Research and Innovation Programme in a webinar. Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean and Director, CGSRHR, BRAC JPGSPH participated in the webinar and shared the experience from Bangladesh on how can anthropological approaches inform COVID-19 research and interventions.

IMPACTING PROGRAMME DESIGNS: ACCOUNTABILITY AND RESPONSIVENESS IN INFORMAL SETTLEMENTS FOR EQUITY (ARISE)

Starting from 25 June, to 29 June, 2019, BRAC JPGSPH successfully hosted the first ARISE Annual Partners' meeting in Dhaka, Bangladesh.

Dr Hilary Standing, Professor and Emeritus Fellow, Institute of Development Studies, University of Sussex, Chair of ARISE Advisory panel; and Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman, Chairperson BRAC, Executive Chairperson of Power and Participation Research Centre and ARISE Advisory panel member from Bangladesh attended the meeting. The event was organised with a view to finalise the Theory of Change, log frame and Monitoring Evaluation and Learning Plan, communications and stakeholder engagement strategy, safeguarding strategy and action plans; harmonise and agree on social and governance mapping work package ethics protocols; identify capacity development needs and strategies to meet them; to become familiar with BRAC JPGSPH and the Dhaka informal settlement context and to agree on a work plan for the upcoming year. Respected individuals from London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSTM), University of Glasgow, Institute of Development Studies, LVCT Health were present along with ARISE Bangladesh team members.

In 2019 the School organised a National Consultation Workshop on "Advancing Inclusive and Resilient Urban Development Targeted at the Urban Poor (ADB TA)" in July; Stakeholder Workshop on "Working Together Towards Health Equity in Urban Informal Settlements"

in September and a National Capacity Development Workshop on "Gender-Biased Sex Selection in Bangladesh", December. In May 2020 they also organised a webinar on "COVID-19 Impact on Urban Informal Settlements: Vulnerabilities, Challenges and Responses from 4 Countries".



BHW began with the publication of a series of reports; the BHW Reports, which identified the most critical challenges to the health sector at particular points of time and published insightful situation analyses leading to practical recommendations, based on evidence from existing secondary resources and primary research. BHW is also engaged to gather evidence through regular research for evidence-based advocacy on topical issues to improve the situation related to quality of care, accountability and equity. BHW is poised to form Regional Chapter at district level which acts as a citizens' platform to hold government (and other actors) accountable for their major health sector commitments in their catchment areas.



In February 2020, BHW published "Humanitarian Crisis in Rohingya Camps: A Health Perspective" A BHW Report 2018-2019. The report included a background on the resource mobilisation and financing the humanitarian crisis, the need assessment for resource mobilisation, the level and estimated amount of funding requirement against the actual amount of funding

requirement against the actual amount of funding obtained during 2018 and in 2019, and the major partners/implementation organisations who mobilised the funding during the period, resource requirements for the future and its fiscal implications.



To advocate for change in policies and working closely with stakeholders to push agendas that are of critical national and global importance, 17 advocacy-based events through multi-stakeholder engagements took place in 2019.

JANUARY 2019

CAPACITY BUILDING IN HIGHER EDUCATION: EUROPEAN UNION FUNDED ERASMUS+ PROJECT 'TRANS4M-PH'

BRAC JPGSPH in collaboration with local partner organisations formally inaugurated the European Union funded "Transformative Competency-Based Public Health Education for Professional Employability in

Bangladesh's Health Sector (TRANS4M-PH)" Project on 24 January, 2019. BRAC JPGSPH; International Centre for Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD), Independent University Bangladesh (IUB) and Asian University for Women (AUW) have been awarded the European Union's 2018 ERASMUS+ Capacity Building in Higher Education Grant of 995,000 Euros. Led by BRAC JPGSPH, the pioneering tripartite





institutional partnership has collaboratively implemented the three-year TRANS4M-PH Project, starting from 2019, till 2021. BRAC JPGSPH, IUB and AUW has designed and offered indigenous competency-based Public Health (PH) curricula which ensures professional skills development and strategically addresses the chronic skilled workforce shortage in Bangladesh's health sector. The University of Maastricht (UM), Netherlands and Institute of Development Studies (IDS), University of Sussex, UK has collaborated as the Project's Technical Partners.

Mario Ronconi, Minister Counselor and Head of Unit-Head of Cooperation, Delegation of the European Union was the Special Guest of the event.

SHARING EVIDENCE OF "PSYCHODRAMA AS TRANSFORMATIVE INTERVENTION IN SEXUAL REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (SRH) OF YOUNG MEN IN URBAN SLUMS OF DHAKA: PROOF OF A NOVEL APPROACH"

The School organised a dissemination event on the project tilted "Psychodrama as Transformative Intervention in SRH of Young Men in Urban Slums of Dhaka" on 25 February, 2019. The aim of the project was to explore the existing sexual practices and risky behaviours of urban young adult men and measure the effectiveness of psychodrama and sociodrama as a transformative intervention to change attitudes associated with traditional gender norms and beliefs.

Funded by the the Dutch Research Council (NWO-WOTRO Science for Global Development Program), a Netherlands based funding agency, and was implemented under the Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU) of BRAC JPGSPH.

LAUNCHING OF SHORT DOCUMENTARY: "NARRATIVES OF SINGLE WORKING WOMEN IN DHAKA CITY"

On March 4, 2019 the first screening of "Narratives of Single Working Women in Dhaka City", a short documentary produced by CGSRHR, BRAC JPGSPH based on the research findings of a Share-Net International funded project, took place at BRAC Inn Auditorium. It was also screened at Dhaka Lit Fest on November, 2019.

The video aimed to help professionals and laypersons to consider the perspective of single working women and

acknowledge the challenges they face to make more inclusive and effective public health policies and programmes. Health professionals and development programmers are encouraged to use this video to facilitate discussions around sex, sexuality, gender roles, societal pressures and more among target audiences including other development workers, working on issues of SRHR and even university students.

OFFICIAL LAUNCHING OF THE CENTRE FOR NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES AND NUTRITION (CNCDN), BRAC JPGSPH

On 3 April, 2019 BRAC JPGSPH organised the formal launching ceremony of the 'Centre for Non-Communicable Diseases and Nutrition (CNCDN)' at the Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP). The Centre was established in December 2017 at BRAC JPGSPH in collaboration with Non-Communicable Disease Control Programme (NCDC), Directorate General of Health Service (DGHS);

National Institute of Cardiovascular Diseases (NICVD), BRAC JPGSPH; Bangladesh Institute of Research and Rehabilitation for Diabetes, Endocrine and Metabolic Disorders (BIRDEM); BRAC; and Bangladesh University of Health Science (BUHS). CNCDN is funded by National Institute of Health Research, UK and supported by Global Health Research Unit (GHRU) and Imperial College London, UK. The representatives from the founding partner organisation officially launched the Centre by signing the memorandum of understanding.







SECOND NATIONAL POLICY ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION ON ADOLESCENT NUTRITION

On 8 April, 2019 the Centre for Non-Communicable Diseases and Nutrition (CNCDN), BRAC JPGSPH and partners hosted the second National Policy Roundtable Discussion on Adolescent Nutrition at Dhaka, as an initiative to address the second window of opportunity for adolescent growth and development. This was the last of a series of activities, since its initiation in 2017, to ensure prioritisation of the issues of adolescent

nutrition into the health and nutrition policy of Bangladesh.

Professor Shamsul Alam, Senior Secretary, General Economics Division, Planning Commission was the Chair and Dr Md Shah Nawaz, Director General, Bangladesh National Nutrition Council (BNNC) Co-Chaired the roundtable. Md Abul Kalam Azad, Principal Coordinator, SDG Affairs, Prime Minister's Office was the Chief Guest. Representatives from ministries, directorates, UN agencies, INGOs and academia participated in the roundtable.



SHARING EVIDENCE ON PATHWAYS OF ANTIBIOTIC USE IN BANGLADESH: THE PAUSE STUDY

Pathways of Antibiotic Use in Bangladesh: The PAUSE Study worked on the scenario of Antimicrobial Resistance in Bangladesh. It was conducted by icddr,b in collaboration with Loughborough University, Durham University, and the University of Bristol, United Kingdom.

The School's representatives joined as panelist in the dissemination workshop on 10 April, 2019. The study identified important behaviours around antibiotic use: where people go for antibiotics, what illnesses they seek antibiotics for, and their understanding of how antibiotics work.



DISSEMINATION SEMINAR: HEALTH CARE FOR FORCIBLY DISPLACED MYANMAR NATIONALS (FDMNS) – ACCESS, BEHAVIOUR AND THE CHALLENGES

On 15 April, 2019 a dissemination event was arranged on sharing the evidences from two research studies titled "Health Care and Health-seeking behaviour among Rohingya Refugees in Cox's Bazar" and "Situation Analysis for Delivering Integrated Comprehensive Sexual and Reproductive Services for Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh", funded by the World Health Organization (WHO).

BRAC JPGSPH participated in a panel discussion after the presentations, where they emphasised on the need to focus on infectious diseases and mental health. They recommended a sustainable plan from the government and donors to implement long term health services with respect to the need of the population. The Chief Guest for the event was Mr Mohammed Abul Kalam, Commissioner of the Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commission (RRRC); with Special Guest Dr Mohammad Abdul Matin, Civil Surgeon at the, Directorate General of Health Service (DGHS), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW).





ADDRESSING GENDER BASED VIOLENCE IN BANGLADESH THROUGH STRENGTHENING VOICES AND CAPACITIES

Within April 2019 to September 2020, BRAC JPGSPH and Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST) organised four planned skill development courses on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) and Law funded by Creating Resources for Empowerment in Action (CREA). 16 participants joined the four-day courses which included BLAST Panel Lawyers, District Project Officers, and Paralegals from eight districts across Bangladesh.

Also, there were sessions on struggles and challenges of Hijra community where a transgender and activist, Shova Saker shared her experience with the participants. Other sessions included, Diversity and Sexuality, Domestic Violence and Masculinity, Understanding Bangladesh Legal Framework to SRHR, Laws and Procedure on Rape, Sexual Harassment and Child Sexual Abuse and Issues of Choice and Consent Within the Context of Sexual Assault.







SHARING EVIDENCE: NATIONWIDE STUDY OF SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS (SRHR) OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (PWDS) IN BANGLADESH

Stakeholder Workshop, April 2019

Two separate workshops were organised to identify priority areas for sexual and reproductive health (SRH) research, SRH intervention and policy advocacy for persons with disabilities in Bangladesh. The first brainstorming workshop took place on 23 April, 2019 engaging government officials, academics from Department of Women and Gender Studies, University of Dhaka (DU), and BRAC Institute of Educational Development (BRAC IED). On 25 April, 2019 the second brainstorming workshop engaged participants from different Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) and Disabled Peoples' Organisations (DPOs).



Journalist Orientation Workshop, October 2019

The School arranged a workshop for selected journalists from the leading Bangla and English newspaper and print media houses of the country, including Prothom Alo, New Age, Shomokal, Bhorer Kagoj, Naya Diganta, and Dhaka Tribune. The sessions were geared towards sensitising journalists and emphasising on the importance of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) of PWDs in the country.

First Advisory Committee Meeting, October 2019

An advisory committee meeting was conducted as the advisory panel consisted of renowned development, health, and policy experts from Non-Communicable Diseases Control under Directorate General of Health Services; Disability Detection Survey Programme,

Department of Social Services; Advocacy for Social Change, Technology, Partnership Strengthening Unit of BRAC; Directorate General of Family Planning; Sussex Community NHS Foundation Trust, UK; DFID Bangladesh and from College of Public Health and Health Informatics, Qassim University.

During the meeting, the BRAC JPGSPH research team presented the preliminary research findings of the quantitative survey, intervention mapping and policy landscape with the committee for paving the future steps for the project and to impact the policy dialogues with the Government. The project has been funded by the Embassy of the Royal Kingdom of Netherlands and with partnership with the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), Government of the Peoples Republic of Bangladesh.





DISSEMINATIONS WORKSHOPS ON IMPLEMENTATION RESEARCH: HEALTH SYSTEM STRENGTHENING IN UNICEF SUPPORTED AREAS UNDER COX'S BAZAR, BANGLADESH

BRAC JPGPSH organised two dissemination workshops with key stakeholders in national and district level for the uptake of actionable strategies and options to improve MNCH programme implementation for the Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMNs). The district level dissemination workshop took place in Cox's Bazar on 29 October 2019. The main objective of the workshop was to disseminate the findings of the implementation research with donors, key

policy-makers and programme implementers working for the FDMNs.

On November 2019, another dissemination and advocacy seminar was held at the School with national level policy makers and participants from multiple organisations. The workshops resulted in the dissemination of results from Phase-2 of the Implementation Research (IR) initiative on MNCH programmes for (FDMN) in Cox's Bazar and agreement on future course of action based on the recommendations received from the findings.

The project was funded by UNICEF New York and partnered with UNICEF Bangladesh.





ACTIVE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT: SECOND INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM ON COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS

The second International Symposium on Community Health Workers (CHWs) was held from from 22, November to 24, November, 2019 in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The symposium was organised by icddr,b in collaboration with BRAC JPGSPH, Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Bangladesh; and Save the Children, Bangladesh. Other partners of the symposium were USAID, European Union, UKAID, Management Sciences for Health (MSH), UNICEF, BRAC, UNFPA, WHO, and Vital Strategies.

The symposium facilitated better strategic pathways for developing community-based programmes to prevent and control non-communicable diseases (NCDs) in the context of universal health coverage (UHC) and sustainable development goals (SDGs).

Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury, Adviser and Founding Dean of BRAC JPGSPH, and the former Vice Chair of BRAC, delivered one of the keynote speeches. Professor Syed Masud Ahmed, Director of CoE-HS&UHC, BRAC JPGSPH chaired two parallel sessions at the symposium. Dr Nahitun Naher, Senior Research Fellow, BRAC JPGSPH made an oral

presentation, titled, "Learning from Community Health Workers (CHWs) Driven Programmes in Different Contexts in Bangladesh: A Scoping Review". The sesion was chaired by Dr Kaosar Afsana, Professor, BRAC JPGSPH and moderated by Shahed Hossain, Professor, BRAC JPGSPH.

Dr Afsana also moderated a panel discussion on 'BRAC's Community Health Workers and Impact on Public Health' at the symposium. Dr Selina Amin, Project Director Diploma in Midwifery Project (DMP); and Head, Midwifery Education Programme; and Dr Sharmina Rahman, Strategic Advisor, DMP; participated in a panel discussion, titled 'Midwives as a part of Health Workforce', which was moderated by Dr Afsana. Dr Amin gave a presentation on "Midwife as Community Health Worker" and Dr Rahman gave a presentation on 'Midwife Led Care Centres, Importance for Skills Building' at the panel discussion. DMP also showcased its overall project activities at the CHW Symposium 2019.

On Day Two, a parallel session titled "CHWs and Universal Health Care" was co-chaired by Professor Zahidul Quayyum, Director of Research and Co-Director of CUEH, BRAC JPGSPH and Dr Md. Khalequzzaman Associate Professor, Department of Public Health and Informatics, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University Hospital (BSMMU), Bangladesh.




SHARING FINDINGS FROM EARLY CHILD MARRIAGE

The Centre of Excellence GSRHR, BRAC JPGSPH organised a knowledge dissemination event on December 1, 2019 for the Prevention of Early Child Marriage in Urban Slums of Bangladesh project funded by International Development Research Centre (IDRC), Canada. The study aimed to understand the factors that shape early marriage among adolescent girls in urban slums and to review programmes and policies in relation to early marriage in Bangladesh.

The research findings from the three-year-long project were shared with multiple stakeholders working on

issues of child marriage and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) both in Bangladesh and the region. Additionally, a book titled "Lives of Adolescent Girls in Urban Slums" based on the research findings was launched at the event.

A mobile app in Bangla for android devices featuring Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) information for young people funded by the Dutch Research Council (NWO-WOTRO) (Netherlands) was launched in the presence of Special Guest Jeroen Steeghs, Deputy Head of Mission and Head of Economic Affairs and Development Cooperation, Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands.






ACTIVE ENGAGEMENT AND SHARING EVIDENCE: PROMOTING RIGHTS THROUGH INCLUSION AND EMPOWERMENT (PRITIE)

BRAC JPGSPH and Bangladesh Legal Aid And Services Trust (BLAST) organised 12 discussion sessions on issues related to SRHR and Law with students of six public and private universities across Bangladesh. The sessions provided simple trainings on SRHR topics, hosted film screenings on various issues around sexual and reproductive rights, sexual harassment, etc. These active engagements aimed to create a pool of young people with knowledge, awareness and understanding of SRHR, consent and choice.

Four poster competitions with a selected group of students from public universities and a national film competition with both public and private universities was organised. The selected group of students also received training and awareness around the laws and issues of SRHR which equipped them to engage in these advocacy initiatives and create a peer learning platform. The film competition videos were later shared on social media platforms and used by BRAC JPGSPH and BLAST as resource materials and displayed during various events.

The project was funded by Swedish Associate for Sexuality Education (RFSU).


SOCIAL MEDIA TO SPREAD AWARENESS ON COVID-19



SHARING EVIDENCE: VIDEO DOCUMENTARY ON KALIGANJ BIRTH AND DEATH REGISTRATION IMPLEMENTATION RESEARCH

A video documentary on Kaliganj birth and death registrations implementation research was screened at the validation workshop, on March 2020 based on the study report of Kaliganj model assessment on birth registration organised by the Cabinet Division of the Government of Bangladesh. The documentary was made on the Civil Registration and Vital Statistics (CRVS) project in Kaliganj, Gazipur in 2019 by CoE-SISU, BRAC JPGSPH. The objective of the video was to show the implementation process of the birth and death registration in Kaliganj which is known as the Kaliganj Model. Interviews of relevant stakeholders were taken to better understand the process from the birth of a child to the receiving of the birth certificate.

The project was funded by UNICEF Bangladesh.



MEDICAL TREATMENT LOAN & MEDICAL TREATMENT LOAN PLUS (MTL & MTL+)

A video documentary was created on the Medical Treatment Loan and Medical Treatment Loan Plus (MTL & MTL+) programme that is available through BRAC. The documentary was part of the research project titled, "Assessing BRAC's Innovative Health Loans in Protecting the Poor against Health and Asset Vulnerability in Bangladesh".

The objective of the video was to show how the MTL programme functions and how BRAC has incorporated the research findings by BRAC JPGSPH into their programme MTL+.

CREATING OPPORTUNITIES: FELLOWSHIP GRANTS OFFERED BY BRAC JPGSPH

CGSRHR at BRAC JPGSPH, and BLAST jointly provided 13 fellowship grant opportunities for junior and mid-level individuals and organisations from Bangladesh to develop advocacy material around preventing Gender Based Violence (GBV), funded by Creating Resources for Empowerment in Action (CREA). The initiative was targeted to empower early and mid-career researchers, development professionals, legal practitioners, artists and human rights activists focusing on gender and SRHR rights issues.

Different advocacy materials such as documentaries, fiction drama, comic strips, photo narratives, blogs, digital puppet shows, short stories have been developed by the fellows on issues, such as rape culture, realities of transgender and intersex communities, medial representation of gender-based violence etc.


Promoting SRHR of PWDs in Bangladesh in the Context of SDGs and UNCRPD

BRAC JPGSPH organised the online Policy Dialogue Workshop titled "Promoting Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights of Male Youths (15-24 years) in Bangladesh: Challenges and Opportunities" to share and discuss their research findings from the study, "Male Youths and their Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) in Bangladesh: A Mixed-Methods Nationwide Study". This research was funded by the Embassy of The Royal Kingdom of the Netherlands.

The discussion ended with a conclusion that addressing male SRHR needs to be included in the national policy

with utmost importance and immediate action which will be mediated not only by the government officials and NGO workers but also with the active participation of the community people.
